

Part 1 · WE ARE CREATED WITH PURPOSE

Ephesians 2:10 For we are God's own handiwork (His workmanship), recreated in Christ Jesus and born anew, that we may do those good works which God predestined (planned beforehand, prepared ahead of time) for us, that we should walk in them, living the good life which He prearranged and made ready for us to live.

CREATED TO BE SIGNIFICANT

We are designed to make a significant contribution in life AND in the Kingdom of God. God created all of us in multiple ways to accomplish His will through us and in this way experience true personal fulfillment. Here are three ways that reveal how He created us.

- 1. Our SPIRITUAL GIFTS tell us WHAT we do best in the Kingdom of God. They are spiritual abilities and activities given by the Holy Spirit which give us tremendous joy and enhance the Body of Christ.
 - A. The Spiritual Gifts survey will identify 4 or more Spiritual Gifts that we currently use.
- 2. Our PERSONAL STYLE of ministry or temperament tells us HOW we can serve with confidence. This is our own unique personality. Knowing our personality or temperament will help us to understand what kind of work environment is best for us. As well, it will help us to know how to work with different personalities.

- A. There are many personality surveys available such as the Biblical DiSC survey and Myers-Briggs profile. In this course we will take an abbreviated Myers-Briggs personality survey.
- 3. Our PASSION tells us WHERE we can best focus our energy or motivation. It is the area in which we have a strong desire to make a significant impact.
 - A. We will wrestle with questions such as, what would I do if I knew I couldn't fail and that all the necessary resources would be available?

A BRIEF LOOK AT PURPOSE

- 1. The natural habitat of a fish is in the water. If you remove a fish from their environment they are "a fish out of water" and will certainly die. In the same way, if we do not ultimately find the environment for which we have been created we will, in a sense, die to God's purpose for our lives.
- 2. **Motion without movement** Many have never been taught or encouraged to take the time to discover their Divine purpose for life. Therefore life is a random experiment, filled with motion but not necessarily movement towards God's purpose or destiny. Life ends up being a hit and miss journey resulting in frustration, disappointment, and failure.
 - A. Proverbs 29:18 Where there is no vision (no revelation of God and His word), the people are unrestrained; but happy and blessed is he who keeps the law (of God).
- 3. **There are two great days in a person's life**, the day they were born and the day they discover why. It's when we discover why they were born that a life of purpose begins.
 - A. Discovering why is only a part of the process. To follow through we must overcome certain, personal obstacles which seem to be based on being self-conscious rather than God conscious.
 - Inadequate and insecure feelings about our abilities.
 - Fearful to risk and a fear of failure.
 - Not motivated.
 - A worldly focus.
 - A deep desire for the approval of others.
 - Not knowing where to begin.
 - What challenges have *you* faced that seemed to have halted you in the past?
 - B. Because of these challenges people choose to take an easier road and never make an effort to stretch their faith in order to fulfill God's purpose for their lives. A change in paradigm is required...
 - "I'd *like* to do that," must become, "I'm *going* to do that and do whatever is necessary to see that become a reality in my life!" **Everything is halted until we have victory over this.**
 - C. God spoke through the prophet Habakkuk and told him to write down the vision the Holy Spirit had given (something still for today but seldom done).
 - Habakkuk 2:2-3 Then the LORD answered me and said, "Record (write) the vision and inscribe it on tablets, that the one who reads it may run. For the vision is yet for the appointed time; it hastens toward the goal and it will not fail. Though it tarries, wait for it; for it will certainly come, it will not delay...
 - By the end of this course we will have the opportunity to do just that: write an abbreviated version of our purpose statement in light of who we are.

4. **Understand that God does everything with a purpose in mind.** (Romans 8:28)

A. Even when Israel was in captivity God moved on the prophet Jeremiah to give these great words in 29:11 *For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope.* (Genesis 1:26-27)

5. God began with a purpose in mind and created YOU! (Jeremiah 1:5)

- A. We are created in the image of God Himself.
 - Genesis 1:26-28 Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." So God created man in His own image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. Then God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it; have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over every living thing that moves on the earth."
- B. We have been "skillfully made!"
 - Psalms 139:13-18 For You formed my inward parts; You covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; marvelous are Your works, and that my soul knows very well. My frame was not hidden from You, when I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought (an embroidery) in the lowest parts of the earth...
 - God has a detailed map of your life journey but it is not a guarantee of things to come unless you partner with Him in seeing His purposes lived out through you!
- C. We are God's unique workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do great things. (Ephesians 2:10)

6. You cannot find your Divine purpose apart from a personal relationship with your Creator!

- A. John 6:68 Simon Peter answered Him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."
- 7. **Purpose is not initially known or obvious, except to God**. The people in the Bible whom God used experienced an unveiling of their purpose over time. Here are a few examples...
 - A. God created <u>Adam and Eve</u> with a Divine purpose and mandate.
 - Genesis 1:28 Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it.
 - B. God touched <u>Abraham</u>, a pagan from Mesopotamia, because He saw a way to bless the families of the world through him.
 - Genesis 12:2-3...and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you.
 - C. In spite of great challenges, <u>Joseph</u> was given a Divine purpose to protect and prosper God's people.
 - Genesis 37:1-11, 50:19-21 You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives.

- D. God touched <u>Moses</u>, a fearful, stuttering failure, because He saw in Moses a deliverer of His people.
 - Exodus 3:7-10 So now, go. I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people the Israelites out of Egypt.
- E. God chose a terrified <u>Joshua</u> to conquer and posses Canaan and to bring God's people into the Promised Land of Israel.
 - Joshua 1:1-9 Now then, you and all these people, get ready to cross the Jordan River into the land I am about to give to them to the Israelites.
- F. God touched <u>David</u>, a willing shepherd boy, because He saw one of the world's greatest kings and a forerunner of the Messiah, Jesus, the Son of David.
 - Psalm 78:70-71 He chose David his servant and took him from the sheep pens; from tending the sheep he brought him to be the shepherd of his people Jacob, of Israel his inheritance.
- G. God touched <u>Gideon</u>, a cowering thresher of wheat, and called him a mighty man of courage and a great deliverer for God's people.
 - Judges 6:14 The LORD turned to him and said, "Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. Am I not sending you?"
- H. God gave <u>Ieremiah</u> his Divine call and purpose in the womb.
 - Jeremiah 1:4-5 ... before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations.
- I. God called and empowered ordinary people like <u>Peter and the disciples</u> to spread the Gosnel
 - Matthew 4:18-22 ... Then He said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men."
- J. God chose <u>Paul</u>, a persecutor of His people, to be one to bring the Gospel outside of Israel.
 - Acts 9:15-16 This man is my chosen instrument to carry my name before the Gentiles and their kings...
- K. And YOU! We, too, discover our purpose when we entrust our life to our Creator. As we conquer our fears, God uses us in ways we never imagined possible!
 - Ephesians 3:20-21 For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them...

THE FOUNDATION OF SERVANTHOOD

- 1. Success in God's Kingdom is not based on our ability, talents or strength but on servanthood empowered by the Holy Spirit. (Zechariah 4:6)
 - A. John 13:1-17 ...So when He had washed their feet, taken His garments, and sat down again, He said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call Me Teacher and Lord, and you say well, for so I am. If I then, your Lord





and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them. (Matthew 20:25-28; Philippians 2:5-11)

- 2. We are all called to serve others through God's love.
 - A. Galatians 5:13 For you, brethren, have been called to liberty; only do not use liberty as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another.
- 3. Serving one another is actually serving God.
 - A. Colossians 3:23-24 And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ.
- 4. Serving is an act of obedience and worship.
 - A. Matthew 4:10 You shall worship the Lord your God, and Him only you shall serve.
 - B. Romans 12:1 *Present your bodies as a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship.*

Part 2 · OUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS

1 Corinthians 12:7 *Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good.*

DEFINITION

- 1. Our Spiritual Gifts reveal WHAT we do best in God's Kingdom.
- 2. Spiritual gifts are unique abilities given by the Holy Spirit to every believer according to God's design and purpose for the building up of the body of Christ.
 - A. Spiritual Gifts are not to and for us as they are abilities to benefit others. Some tend to boast that they are blessed with certain Spiritual Gifts. However, the gifts are never intended to be FOR us but to be used in the context of the needs of others.

EACH ONE OF US IS UNIQUE "Being the only one of its kind; unlike anything else."

1. Just like your fingerprint, everyone of us is a unique, "one of a kind," creation to experience a meaningful place of service in the Church.

- A. Romans 12:4-8 For as we have many members in one body, but all the members do not have the same function, so we, being many, are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another...
- B. 1 Corinthians 12:4-12 There are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are differences of ministries, but the same Lord. And there are diversities of activities, but it is the same God who works all in all. But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to each one for the profit of all:... But one and the same Spirit works all these things, distributing to each one individually as He wills.
- C. 1 Corinthians 12:12 *The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ.*

2. You are a key person!

CHARACTERISTICS OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

- 1. We are to be aware of our gifts and learn to use them as God provides the opportunities.
 - A. 1 Corinthians 12:1 *Now about spiritual gifts, brothers, I do not want you to be ignorant (uninformed).*
- 2. In the original Greek the word for "gift," as used in the context of a Spiritual Gift, is "charis" or "charisma." It is an ability that, when used by the Holy Spirit, brings joy and results in devotion to God and a love for others in the Body of Christ.
 - A. 1 Corinthians 12:4-6 There are different kinds of gifts (charis), but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work.
- 3. The Body of Christ is diverse and made up of a vast array of people functioning in many different ways and gifts.
 - A. Romans 12:4-5 For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.
- 4. Spiritual Gifts are distributed by the Holy Spirit to every believer for meaningful service.

- A. 1 Corinthians 12:11, 18 All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines.
- 5. We will be held accountable for whether or not we use them in obedience to the Holy Spirit.
 - A. Matthew 25:14-30 ... His master replied, "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!" (1 Corinthians 4:2, 1 Peter 4:10)
- 6. Spiritual Gifts are given for the building up of the body of Christ by empowering members to serve one another.
 - A. Ephesians 4:11-16 ...From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.
- 7. Through the use of Spiritual Gifts, God's love flows through ME to others! (If I have been given the spiritual gift/ability of healing I need to find people needing healing)

THREE WAYS SPIRITUAL GIFTS ARE EXPRESSED

- 1 Corinthians 12:4-7 There are different kinds (great variety) of <u>gifts</u>, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of <u>service</u>, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of <u>working</u>, but the same God works all of them in all men...
- 1. Gifts (Charisma) The basic spiritual drive God places in us to enrich His Church.
- 2. Service (Diakoneo) The opportunities which are open to us to exercise of our basic motivation.
 - A. This is the word from which we get the word "deacon" or servant and literally means to be an attendant, to wait upon menially or as a host. (Matthew 20:28
 - B. Matthew 20:28 "...just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve (diakoneo), and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 1045 John 13:1-17)
- 3. Working (Energema) The effect in the lives of those to whom we minister as directed by the Holy Spirit.
 - A. This is where we get the word energy or energetic.
- 4. The primary New Testament passages dealing with Spiritual Gifts are found in:
 - A. Romans 12:3-8 These are typically called the believer's motivational gifts given by the Father that represent what God does in believers after salvation to shape their perspective on life and motivate their words and actions.
 - B. 1 Corinthians 12:4-11; 1 Peter 49 These are *spiritual abilities that* reveal how God works through a believer in a given situation to demonstrate His supernatural power.
 - God also gave several abilities in the Old Testament that qualify as Spiritual

- C. Ephesians 4:11-13 These are the office gifts, given by Jesus to build up the Church. Ministry gifts are often confirmed by ordination.
 - The Apostle Paul told Timothy in 1 Timothy 4:14, Do not neglect the gift that is in you, which was given to you by prophecy with the laying on of the hands of the eldership.

THE STEWARDSHIP OF OUR GIFTS

1 Peter 4:10 Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms.

- 1. Ways we can abuse the understanding and use of our spiritual gifts...
 - A. Doubting the importance of our spiritual gift so that we supress its expression.
 - B. Viewing our gift as "special."
 - 1 Corinthians 12:12-26 ...But God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that lacked it,25 so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other...
 - C. Projecting our spiritual gift upon others, expecting them to serve as effectively as we do with similar results.
 - D. Not serving others but using our spiritual gift for personal satisfaction.
 - Our spiritual gifts are not *for us* but are to be used by the Holy Spirit *through* us as He sees necessary.
 - E. Not allowing the Holy Spirit to use us outside of our spiritual gifts.
 - Our spiritual gifts are a starting point for service. At times God may use us in ways not necessarily in line with our spiritual gifts. In this way we learn to trust Him more.
- 2. Developing our spiritual gifts is done *primarily* in the context of people serving one another.
 - A. Read Ephesians 1 and 2 and count the number of "togethers."


GETTING STARTED

- 1. What can we do to develop our Spiritual Gifts?
 - A. Start small. (Zechariah 4:10; Mathew 13:31-32)
 - B. Once we discover our spiritual gifts, use them as God provides the opportunities. Become a contributing member of the Christian Life Center. In doing this you'll experience growth in your relationship with God and see visible fruit in your life. (John 15:16)
 - C. Be confident in God's ability to empower you and to accomplish His will in your life.
 - D. Do not view ministry as a stepping stone to "greater ministry." God will move you on as He sees the need. (Matthew 25:21)

- E. Appreciate proven ministry and learn from them. (2 Timothy 2:2)
- F. Give yourself and the ministry time. (Galatians 4:4, 1 Timothy 2:6)
- G. Live the "Be-Attitudes: be wholehearted, be flexible, be teachable, be a team player, be dependable, be a roe model. (Ephesians 6:7-8)
- H. Encourage and assist other believers in their spiritual development. Lead by example and guide others into a deeper understanding of what it means to serve Jesus Christ and His people.

WHO'S MISSING?

- 1. Because the Body of Christ is made up of many members with different gifts, expressions and intensities, the Body of Christ *is* affected when people are not involved and active (Note the illustration of an "incomplete" body drawn by a friend).
- 2. How do you think inactivity affects the Church?
- 3. Even though people may know their spiritual gifts, why do you think some do not express them in service?




ADDENDUM — DEFINITIONS OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Administration — The ability to help determine long range goals and devise plans to see the goals carried out in the Body of Christ. (1 Corintians 12:28)

Apostle — The ability to be sent into areas with no viable work and to begin one, and then to govern and assume the leadership for churches in a given region. (Ephesians 4:11)

Craftmanship — The divine enablement to facilitate ministry through various creative means and styles. (Exodus 31: 2-11, Acts 9: 36-39)



Creative Communication — The divine ability to communicate God's truth through a variety of art forms. (1 Chronicles 25:1-7)

Deliverance — The ability to cast out demons and evil spirits. (Acts 8:5-8)

Discernment — The ability to know with assurance whether a behavior said to be of God is in fact of God or of flesh or of satanic origin. (1 Corinthians 12:10)

Encouragement — The ability to speak words of comfort, consolation, encouragement and counsel to people in such a way as to strengthen and help. (Romans 12:8)

Evangelism — The ability to share the gospel with people readily and naturally and seeing people respond to the message. (Ephesians 4:11)

Faith — The ability to discern with extra-ordinary confidence to the will and purposes of God for the future of His work. (1 Corinthians 12:9)

Giving — The ability to contribute material resources to the work of the Lord with liberality and cheerfulness. (Romans 12:8)

Healing — The ability to pray the sick or injured and see them healed. (1 Corinthians 12:9)

Helps — The ability to invest time and talents into another ministry to increase another ministries effectiveness. (1 Corinthians 12:28)

Hospitality — The ability to provide food and shelter to anyone in need. (1 Peter 4:9-10)

Intercession — The ability to pray for extended periods of time on a regular basis to see specific answers to prayer. (Colossians 4:12)

Interpretation of tongues — The ability to interpret utterances in tongues given in a public gathering.

(1 Corinthians 12:10)

Knowledge — The ability to receive and communicate specific facts relating to people and situations.

(1 Corinthians 12:8)

Leadership — The ability to set goals, communicate them to others and then place people in areas best suited to accomplish these goals. (Romans 12:8)

Mercy — The ability to feel sympathy and compassion to individuals suffering and then to translate to those feeling to cheerfully done deeds of service. (Romans 12:8)

Miracles — The ability to serve as human intermediaries of God to perform powerful acts that alter the ordinary course of nature. (1 Corinthians 12:10, 28)

Missionary — The ability to minister to people of another culture and even adapt to that culture for the ministry of the gospel. (Acts 13:2-3, Romans 10:15)

Pastor/Shepherding — The ability to assume a long term personal responsibility for the spiritual welfare of a group of people. (Ephesians 4:11)

Prophecy — The ability to receive and communicate a message from God to His people. (Romans 12:6, Ephesians 4:11)

Service — The ability to recognize and resolve needs in a task related to God's work. (Romans 12:7)

Teaching — The ability to clearly communicate information relevant to the health and ministry to the Body and it's members. (Ephesians 4:11)

Tongues — The ability to speak in a language not known by the speaker. This is done in the context of a public gathering. (1 Corinthians 12:10, 28)

Wisdom — The ability to receive and communicate God given insight to specific needs arising in the Body of Christ. (1 Corinthians 12:8)


